ONHGS PROGRAMS 1993

On <u>Tuesday September 21, 1993</u>, Mr. Bill Murphy of Raleigh will lecture on the Carter family of Eastern North Carolina. Mr. Murphy, an antique dealer and genealogist, has done extensive research on many families from our part of the state. He recently returned from a research trip to England. His books include abstracted records of Dobbs, Green, Duplin and Halifax counties. The lecture will take place at 7:00 p.m. in room 105 Bear Hall on the campus of UNCW.

On <u>Tuesday October 19, 1993, Miss Grace-Ellen McCrann</u> of Wilmington will lecture on Scottish culture. Forty thousand Scots immigrated to our area of the state prior to the Revolution bringing their religion and customs with them. Miss McCrann, who travels often to Scotland, is the American representative for many Scottish firms, writes a column for <u>Scottish World Magazine</u>, and is the editor of <u>The Patriot</u>, a <u>Scottish/American Military magazine</u>. Her program will focus on clans, tartans, music, food, and other aspects of Scottish heritage. The lecture will take place at 7:00 p.m. in room 105 of Bear Hall on the campus of UNCW.

On <u>Tuesday November 16, 1993, Mr. Bill Bennett</u> of Raleigh will lecture on North Carolina records gleaned from U.S. Federal Court Records. In 1985 he published <u>Catalogue</u>. North <u>Carolina Federal Court Records at the National Archives</u>, <u>Atlanta Branch</u>, which guides the researcher through the difficult task of using these valuable but unindexed records. Through the encouragement of Mr. Bennett the North Carolina Genealogical Society has been paying to have these records microfilmed and has been donating the film to the North Carolina Archives. Mr. Bennett is a genealogist, lecturer, and author of many genealogical abstracts. His lecture will begin at 7:00 p.m. in 105 Bear Hall on the campus of UNCW.



John $\underline{\text{London}}$, Reuben $\underline{\text{Newton}}$ and F. $\underline{\text{Simpson}}$ excused from attending as jurymen at this term.

Jonathan **Evans** fined 5 lb. nisi for contempt of court.

Court adjourned till 10 o'clock tomorrow.

Tuesday 17th December. 1805

Court met according to adjournment. Present the Worshipful: Wm. Cutler, Sam'l Ashe, Thos. Devane

Jesse \underline{Rooks} and David \underline{Bowen} excused from their fines for not attending at last term as jurors.

*** RARE BIBLE PROVES SURNAME ***

Recently, we heard of a delightful story concerning an old established genealogical line from Dr. Dallas <u>Herring</u> of Rose Hill. (Members will remember his excellent program at the April 1993 meeting)

Dr. <u>Herring</u> was reading a copy of the <u>State Magazine</u> when he happened to see a reprint of a 1948 item about a very rare family bible, which was published in 1606. It contained <u>Herring</u> family data and had been handed down in the family of the late North Carolina Supreme Justice. Jefferson <u>Johnson</u>, who was a Herring descendant. Given to the Rev. F.D. <u>Swindell</u>, a Methodist

Minister, for preservation, the Bible was presented by him to the library of Duke University, where it is held in the rare book collection, not because of the family data, but because of its very early date of publication.

Dr. <u>Herring</u> immediately contacted Judge Johnson's daughter, Frances Faison <u>Johnson</u> of Clinton, who was able to obtain copies of the pertinent family information in the Bible. Most of the entries in the Bible were made by Mary **Herring**, daughter of Richard and Sarah <u>Herring</u>.

For years, the wife of Richard Herring (1725/6-1803), a Revolutionary Patriot, had been listed as Sarah Anders (1732/3-1813). A succession of family researchers had uncovered nothing about her parentage. The Bible offered proof that Sarah's maiden name was not Anders, but she was born Sarah Meredith. The will of her father, Joseph Meredith, further establishes her parentage.

If it had not been for the alertness uf Dr. Herring, the error in the line would have continued to be repeated.


A RECORD OF TEE PAST

[From the <u>Daily Journal</u>, Friday April 9, 1875, page 4, submitted by Joan Kerr Brown.]

A gentleman of this city has just exhibited to me a very interesting record of the past ages. It is the "Catalogue of the Members Dialectic Society of the University of North Carolina," containing a full list of the members of that Society from its institution, June 1795, to the close of the year 1851.

We find in its pages the names of many of our most honored citizens, a few of whom are now alive, the majority having passed to the farther shore. In the class of 1795 we find the name of Col. Maurice Moore; in 1796, that of Alexander Kirkpatrick; 1798, John B. London and Hon. John D. Toomer, Judge Superior and Supreme Courts; 1801, Nathaniel Adams, Thomas Brown and Joseph H. New Hanover County Deed Book C

[Many of New Hanover County's earliest records have been destroyed by Courthouse fires. The first two deed books, A and B, were combined to form Book AB. They have been abstracted and published by ONHGS member Mae Blake Graves. New Hanover County was formed in 1729 from Craven County. Bladen and Onslow Counties were formed from New Hanover in 1734, Duplin County in 1750, Brunswick County in 1764, part of New Hanover was annexed to Sampson County in 1795, and Pender County was formed from New Hanover in 1875.
