**The Confederate Hospital at Wilmington, NC
General Hospital #4**

Several years ago, an important discovery was made in the National Archives in Washington, DC. It was determined that there were extant records of servicemen, who were in various hospitals, operated by the Confederate Government in Wilmington during the Civil War. The Old New Hanover Genealogical Society paid a researcher to verify and identify these original documents. Funds to have these documents microfilmed were received from Friends of the New Hanover County Public Library, the Civil War Round Table, **Oakdale** Cemetery and the Cape Fear Chapter #3, United Daughters of the Confederacy. A copy of this microfilm is now available for researchers in the North Carolina Room of the New Hanover Public Library.

General Hospital #4 was in the Seamen's Home, located on the southwest corner of Dock and South Front streets. Converted to a hospital early in the war, it became a civilian hospital during the tragic yellow fever epidemic of 1862. In early 1863, this 200 bed facility reverted back to an army hospital and it continued to be operated as such until the fall of Wilmington to Federal Troops in February 1865.

Robert J. Cooke, a noted Civil War researcher, has undertaken the worthwhile project of transcribing the records into a spreadsheet format, which at this date is about 60% complete with over 2800 names. The original records in chronological order have been alphabetized by surname of the patient. The columns of the spreadsheet follow the format of the original and contain the name and rank of the soldier; the unit (regiment and company); the disease or reason for hospital admittance; date admitted, date discharged; ward and bed numbers; patient's post office; baggage location and references to microfilm number or other works. In many cases, not all the information was filled in. Sometimes, all that was written was the man's name, rank, unit and date admitted. However, in some incidences, a more complete record is given.

There is another column marked "other," which contains the date the soldier returned to duty or if available the soldier's disposition (furloughed, transferred, died, discharged, deserted). Mr. Cooke remarks, "Furloughs were difficult to come by, but if a soldier was not making progress, the doctors thought it best to send the man home, for better or worse! If he recovered, he was expected to return to duty; if he did not, well then, at least he died at home among friends and family. It is also noteworthy that many of those soldiers listed as deserters were back with their units at the conclusion of the war."

This research tool has been made available by Mr. Cooke on the Society's **website - www.onhgs.org**. Also provided is a short history of General Hospital #4 and a glossary of diseases mentioned in the records. Both add valuable information to these records.

Many people and organizations participated in making these records conveniently available to researchers. We thank the organizations involved, Mr. Cooke and Beverly Tetterton, who coordinated this project.

May Term, 1817
